Fortunately, the City of Tracy has been supportive of us over the years due to our support of the local community through our purchasing of fuel at the airport, attending the Tracy Airport Day, hosting of Young Eagles, and even entertaining many of the local neighbors who, in fact, enjoy watching us fly. You can rest assured that the Board and I will do all we can to maintain the dialog and pressure on the FAA to renew the application and will do whatever we need to with the Community of Tracy to maintain their support for our activities. We may need help with this so would appreciate any time

Unfortunately, these groups have gotten a couple of Senator's involved who have petitioned Marion Blakely at the FAA to require a much more thorough Environmental Impact Review prior

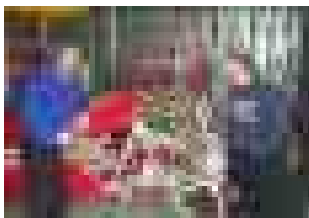


Milestones

Goodbyes

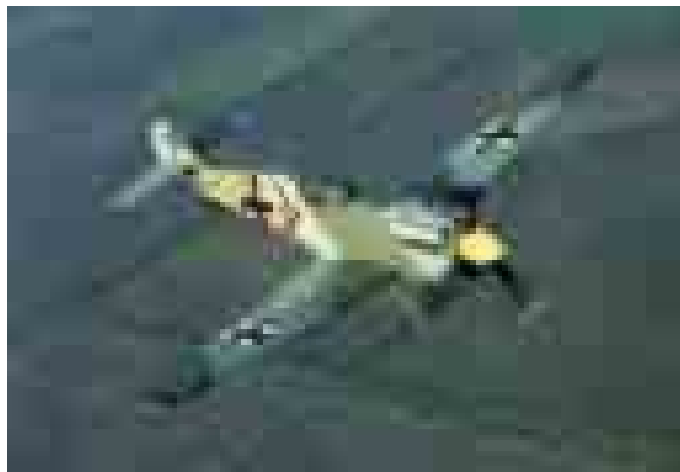

Member Of The Month - Norm DeWitt

Norm DeWitt is probably the most successful pilot in Chapter 38. He is part of the reason I started flying aerobatics and he probably doesn't know how much he has helped me through the years.

His dedication to a single goal is inspiring. I think Norm has a lot to say to us newer competitors. If you are at a contest and see him – see if you can pick his brain about a few things.

I hope you find this interview interesting. I know I did!

Side note... I want a ride in an F15!

When did you become a pilot and why?

I learned to fly in the summer of 1964 at the Palo Alto Airport. At the time, I was an aeronautical engineering student at Notre Dame. I had an interest in airplanes since I was a young boy, and I had always wanted to fly, so I got a job at Nystrom Aviation, as a line boy. As an employee, I was able to rent a Cherokee 140 for \$10 per hour and the instructor was \$5. The prices have changed a little since, then haven't they?

What was your first experience with aerobatics?

In the 1970's, my wife gave me a 10 hour Introduction to Aerobatics course as a birthday present. I learned the basic positive G maneuvers in a Super Decathlon at Blue Aviation at San Carlos at Airport.

Do you compete (past, present, future plans)?

I compete in the Unlimited category, presently. I worked my way up from Sportsman in 1995. I spent one year in each category, except Advanced. I spent two years in Advanced, because I lost my Zivko Edge in an off-field landing accident.

If so, why and what got you into competition?

I got into competition just to see what it was like. My first contest was the Los Angeles Gold Cup at Taft, CA. I won Highest Scoring First Time Sportsman and finished in first place. Needless to say, I had fun and became hooked on the sport.

What is your most memorable contest experience?

Winning the Championships of the Americas in Advanced in Chandler, AZ. I earned a beautiful FAI gold medal that I have

framed on my wall.

What is your favorite part of a contest?

I enjoy seeing other people that I have met in the sport over the years. I also enjoy meeting new people. Then, as far as the contest goes, I enjoy trying to put myself in "the zone", and focus exclusively on the tasks in front of me.

Where do you see yourself going in the sport?

Well, I really have set a goal to earn a spot on the US Team and compete in a World Aerobatic Championship. Last summer, I competed in the WAC held in Lakeland, FL as an independent. It was a great experience meeting and flying with the best pilots in the world. I want to do that again.

What other aspects of aviation are you interested in?

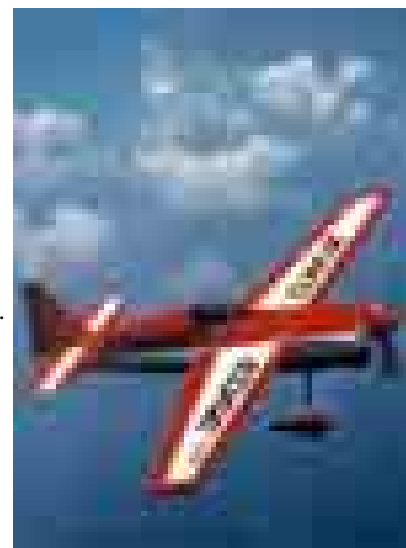
I am a board member of the United States Aerobatic Foundation (USAF). I would like to help USAF become much more financially stable than it is at the present time. Now, USAF lives hand to mouth, financially. It was also saddled with a large unplanned expense from the Air Force for transporting our team to the last European WAC. In the future, the availability of the C5-A may go away, so, it is going to put additional fundraising pressures on the organization. I would like to see USAF funded and endowed to support our future teams' needs.

What aircraft do you fly, and why?

I own and fly a Zivko Edge 540. I purchased it, because I feel that it is the best aerobatic airplane available in the world. Also, you don't have to wash oil off your clothes all the time.

What other hobbies do you have besides flying?

I am also an avid snow skier, although I don't get to the slopes as much as I used to do



What do you do for a living?

I am retired from the computer industry.

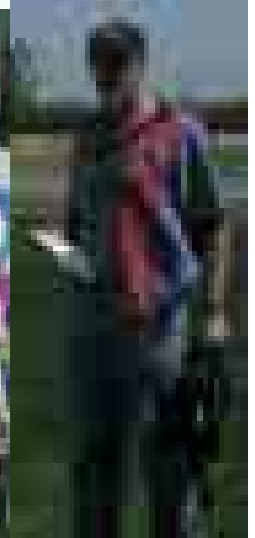

A Missing Stop Pin On The Throttle Control

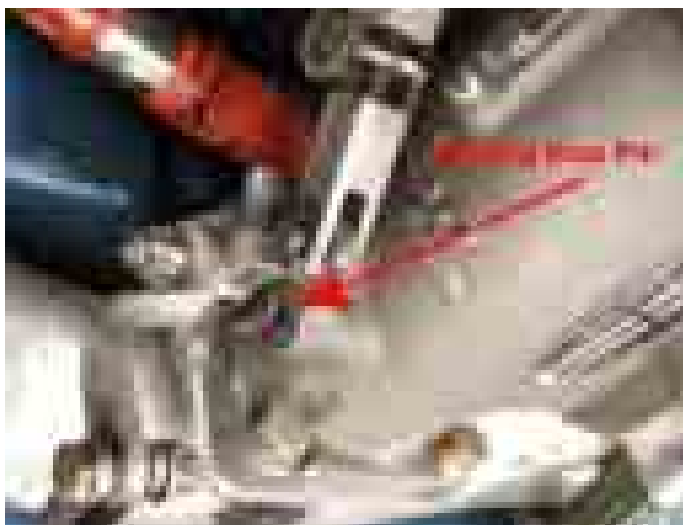
Last month, coming in for a landing, I had the runway made and cut power, like I always do. Only this time the propeller stopped, when I was still 10 feet up in the air. That wasn't good. It turned out the little stop pin on the Bendix servo fuel injector that would prevent the throttle lever from going past the idle setting had fallen out, so when cutting power, I completely closed the air intake and killed the engine.

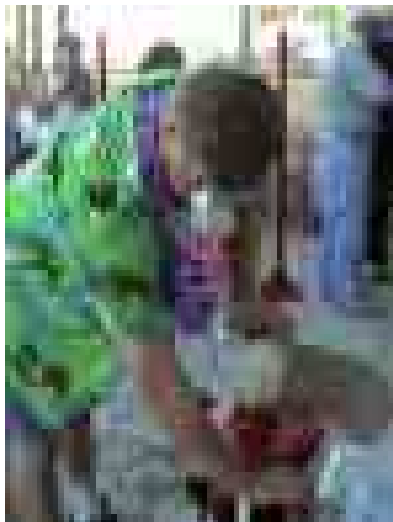
It turned out that the Bendix Corp. products are now being sold and supported by Precision AirMotive. I got a hold of a guy in their parts department, that knew exactly what pin I was talking about. He would gladly send me one for ~\$40 and it came with a little swearing about how airplane parts was expensive because of sleazy lawyers with their class ac-

tion lawsuits and people not taking responsibility for their own actions, etc. I couldn't agree more, but I still had to pay ~\$40 for a half inch long little pin.

Also, this must not be the first time this has happened, because the pin came along with detailed instructions on how to put the replacement pin in. Unfortunately, it's not a simple screw. The replacement pin had a slightly bigger diameter, so the hole had to be reamed out, and a small hole must be drilled through the aluminum body for a safety spring pin to hold the stop pin in place. This was more than I was up for doing, so I took the entire servo fuel injector off the engine and brought it over to a local machine shop and they had the job done in no time for a reasonable price.

You might wanna consider checking if your stop pin is loose next time you have the cowling off.

What is your favorite aircraft?

My favorite airplane is the Edge; actually, my Edge.

What was your most memorable flight?

I was invited by the Air Force to the Test Pilot's School at Edwards AFB. On two separate occasions, I was asked to fly test pilot students in my Christen Eagle II. The payback for the first occasion was 1.5 hours in the back seat of an F-16. The second occasion netted an F-15 ride. Both planes are exceptional aircraft, but I have a slight leaning to the F-15. It is very easy to fly. As an example, the pilot gave me the airplane to make the takeoff. The plane went from a standing stop at the end of the runway to 25,000 feet in less than a minute. It is impressive. It was also very easy to land. Final approach was at 155 knots, and it rewarded me with one of the best landings I have ever made.


